SELECTMEN CORNER Selectman's Office Updates:

The Select Board would like to thank all of you who have participated on Town Committees and/or are just beginning your first tour as a committee member. Small towns, like Troy, are dependent on community involvement. It's your participation that makes it "your hometown". Any of us could live in large suburbs or cities if we wanted but the choice to live here probably means you appreciate the sense of community.

Now that we are entering warmer weather and you're thinking about fixing things up a bit as a reminder we will repeat: Anything that will require a Building Permit should start with an application to the Selectmen's Office, even if it requires Planning Board review and or a variance from the Zoning Board of Adjustment the process starts with an application to through the Selectmen's Office. Troy does not require permits for minor renovations, (generally under 200 square feet), as well as several other things that may require permits in other jurisdictions. We encourage you to visit the Town of Troy website, https:// www.troy-nh.us/, we have found that the majority of calls are about Forms and other information that is readily available on our website. (We do understand that the internet isn't for everyone and are happy to provide one on one service as well but if you need forms or info quick you might want to give the website a try.) The Selectmen's Office is happy to answer questions. The phone number for the Selectman's Office is (603) 242-7722.

The Select Board is in the beginning process upgrades in technology and the accounting software used by the Town, the Water & Sewer Commission, and the Tax Collector, (Business Management Systems, Inc aka BMSI), requires an upgrade to be complaint with new requirements from the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. This expense was recommended by the Selectmen, approved by the Budget Committee and Voted in the Budget as submitted at Town Meeting earlier this year.

Water & Sewer bills are now being managed by the Selectmen's Office. This remains a new responsibility for the office and while every effort is being made to manage this change over swiftly and easily there may be glitches. Your patience is appreciated. Remember W&S Bills can no longer be paid at the W&S Plant, they can be paid at the Town Hall or by mail.

Candidates Forum:

The Select Board conducted a Candidates Forum for anyone running for any Town Office. We have done this for several years now and it has proven a good way to get to know who's running for what and how they think they can help. The location was changed from the Selectmen's Conference Room in Town Hall to the Samuel E. Paul Community Center due to the large number of participants both candidates and public members. I won't attempt to recap the event but if you didn't go or watch it at the time you may want to check it out on FB.

Town Meeting:

The Annual Town Meeting was conducted in the Troy School Gym. The meeting started with a presentation of letters to our Town's Treasurer, Janet McCullough, from both Governor Sununu and by the Speaker of the NH House of Representatives for her "exceptional career of service to the Town of Troy" as the "driving force behind the financial success of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire resulting from her sound fiscal management". After that the meeting moved rather swiftly through a number of items, the largest of which was agreeing to a potentially large bond for needed Water & Sewer system repairs. The Selectmen's proposal to reorganize the structure of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Office was defeated.

Town Hall Projects:

The Town Hall painting project should be starting by the time you read this article. We have also begun to prepare an RFP for repairs to the foundation and under pinning's of the first floor of Town Hall. These will be discussed in more detail in future issues of TTN.

County Taxes:

County Taxes have been something of a wild card for us in Troy over the last few years. It is likely they will continue to be for the foreseeable future. The County has set its Budget with only a slightly more than 1% increase, however the distribution of the Counties Budget over the various Towns is a complicated formula and can only be calculated once all the Towns assessments are completed. It is virtually guaranteed that we will not know if our share of eth County Tax is higher or lower and/or by how much until shortly before we must set the Town Tax Rate at the end of the year.

Change Happens:

The Select Board chose a new Chairman after Town Meeting. I have considered it a privilege to act on behalf of the Town as Chairman. Thank you for your support.

STATE HOUSE UPDATE By Dick Thackston State Rep. Cheshire 12 – Troy & Fitzwillam

The following is a list & comments on some of the more interesting bills from this House Session to date.

HB 401 Would have made landlords be at the will of tenants when they wanted to renovate their own properties and would have required them to take the property off the market for a full year no matter when the renovations were completed if the tenant was required to leave for the renovations. If not it held a \$10,000 fine!

Status: Defeated in committee.

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HR 8 Would have called on Congress to implement a new assault weapons ban. Status: Defeated in committee.

HB 76 Would have imposed a three-day waiting period between the purchase and delivery of a firearm, unreasonably restricting access to a firearm for selfdefense.

Status: Defeated in committee.

HB 208 Would have established California-style greenhouse gas emission reduction goals for the state and a climate action plan & tied NH directly to California. Status: Defeated in committee.

HB 50 Would have had the state pay 7.5% of the retirement costs of municipalities' teachers, police & fire, roughly \$25M per year. All this does is encourage over-hiring by schools and municipalities, and/or shift money from one set of taxpayers to another.

This was Amended: Take the \$50M that would have been spent in this biennium (we budget on two-year cycles) and use it to pay down retirement debt faster than it would otherwise. Because of compound interest this will reduce payments into the system by \$105M over the next 16 years and does not encourage overspending by schools and towns on personnel.

Status: Passed w/ Good Amendment.

HB 92 & HB 208

HB 92 Would have required the adoption of "innovative vehicle emissions standards" pursuant to section 177 of the federal Clean Air Act. Status: Defeated in committee.

HB208 Would have established greenhouse gas emission reduction goals for the state and established a climate action plan.

Status: Defeated in committee.

"Both these bills would have allowed the government to dictate what types of cars we could drive, how we could heat our homes, whether we could travel, and what our cost of living would become. The NH House stood up for the freedom of our constituents by saying No to this massive expansion of government control of our lives." -Rep. Michael Vose


HB 125 Would have created unprecedented restrictions to crush youth employment, restricting the opportunities for 16 and 17-year old's to get and work their first real job. If passed, it would pile red tape on employers [and] would particularly target homeschoolers and other outside-of-thebox kids whose schedules don't fit the mold of the public, district schools. In the end, we got support of 100% of Republicans (hardly a given in this House) and a handful of Democrats to defeat the bill by a decent margin. The floor debate is on YouTube.

Status: Defeated on the House floor.

HB57: Would have raised the minimum wage to \$15 an hour and created an annual increase indexed to CPI. The minimum wage would increase every year, forever. Status: Defeated in committee.

HB58: Would have prohibited payment of subminimum wages, that is to say, people who work for tips. This would have been devastating for the hospitality & restaurant industries in NH.

Status: Defeated in Committee

As spring has now become fully realized in what we see outdoors, we are reminded of God's faithfulness. **Psalm 102:25-27**, "Of old you laid the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands. They will perish, but you will remain; they will all wear out like a garment. You will change them like a robe, and they will pass away, but you are the same, and your years have no end."

Following Easter Sunday, we began a new Sunday morning series entitled "Post Resurrection Discernment". This series will cover the multiple times that Jesus appeared to the disciples (and other individuals) over the course of the following 40 days before He ascended into heaven. Through this sermon series, Pastor Clark will explain how we can learn to have Biblical discernment through the study of these post-resurrection appearances.

Discernment means to grasp, understand, and judge well. As followers of Christ, we want to be fully aware of what is going on around us as well as the times we are living in. As the children of Issachar had an "**understanding of the times**" (1 Chronicles 12:32), so should we today.

In the month of April, we learned about Jesus' appearance on the road to Emmaus as well as His appearance to the disciples and then His interaction with Thomas. In the month of May, we will continue this series with sermons regarding Jesus' further appearances and lessons He taught the disciples during these times. When we conclude this series with a sermon about Jesus' ascension back into heaven, we will have come to fully understand how to be a discerning Christ follower.

Our hope as Christ followers is built upon this truth of Jesus' resurrection and His ascension back into heaven. 1 Peter 1:3, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."

"Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

Years ago, at my workplace, there were a group of Christians that met once a week at lunch for what we called a Bible study. One day, I said something about Jesus still being human, and they all looked at me like I was crazy.

I don't want to second guess their faith—none of us have perfect knowledge—but I will say that it exposes a problem, a problem not unlike Thomas', a problem of grasping the resurrection. If Jesus, fully alive in human flesh with human blood flowing in His very human veins, was not standing there in that room with Thomas, then what was the crucifixion for? Anyone can die. But not anyone can, and in that death, atone for sin. Jesus laid down His life in death to cover our sin.

The crucifixion was the most important event in history. Without the shedding of innocent blood there is no forgiveness of sin. The proclamation in Leviticus that the life is in the blood foreshadowed the blood of Christ poured out for you and me. God's glory shines most vividly here. His love made the impossible a reality. His death is our life. But He did not stop there. Jesus then took up His life again as the firstborn from the dead. Do you realize how important that is? If Jesus had not been raised bodily, what chance would we have?

But Jesus was raised up; He did break the bounds of death. He stood there in the presence of Thomas and the others alive—alive with the marks of His sacrifice visible. Thomas saw—and he believed. We have not seen Jesus in the flesh. But we who believe will. We will, in the fullness of time, see Him with our own resurrected eyes.
