# FEBRUARY IS AMERICAN HEART MONTH: HEART-HEALTHY TIPS

February is designated as American Heart Month to advocate cardiovascular health and raise awareness about heart disease. Since 1963, American Heart Month has been celebrated as a way to educate Americans to join the battle against heart disease.

#### What Is Heart Disease?

The phrases "heart disease" and "cardiovascular disease" are used interchangeably to describe the various conditions that affect your heart. Heart or cardiovascular diseases include blood vessel diseases, heart rhythm problems, and congenital heart defects.

The most common form of heart disease in the United States is coronary artery disease (CAD), which occurs when the arteries that supply blood to the heart become hardened and narrowed due to a buildup of cholesterol, known as plaque. CAD can lead to health issues such as heart attack, heart failure, angina (chest pain), stroke, and irregular heartbeat.

#### **Heart-Healthy Habits**

**Get enough exercise.** Physical activity is one of the best ways to improve heart health. The American Heart Association recommends at least 150 minutes per week of moderate exercise.

**Quit smoking.** If you're still smoking, it's time to quit. Benefits to living a smoke-free life include improved circulation, reduced risk of certain types of cancer, and feeling more energetic.

Eat a heart-healthy diet. Load up on fresh fruits and vegetables while limiting saturated fats, salt, and foods containing cholesterol, like fatty meats. A Mediterranean diet focuses on eating a diet rich in fresh fruit and vegetables, whole grains, nuts, and fish and seafood instead of red and processed meats.

Watch your numbers. Get regular check-ups to monitor health conditions that affect the heart, including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and diabetes.

Reduce your alcohol intake. Excess alcohol consumption can worsen health conditions that contribute to heart disease, such as high blood pressure, arrhythmias, and high cholesterol levels.

Watch your weight. Too many pounds can add up to increased heart disease risk.

**Get better sleep.** Sleep is beneficial for brain functionality, metabolism, immune functionality and emotional well-being.

**Reduce stress factors.** Stress can compound many heart disease risks. Take the time to find healthy outlets to relieve stress and lower your risk of heart disease.

#### PRESIDENTS' DAY HISTORY

Historically, Americans began celebrating George Washington's Birthday just months after his death, long before Congress declared it a federal holiday. It was not until 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes, that Washington's Birthday became a legal holiday, to be observed on his birthday, February 22.

Washington's birthday was celebrated on February 22 until well into the 20th century. In 1968, Congress passed the Monday Holiday Law to "provide uniform annual observances of certain legal public holidays on Mondays." By creating more 3-day weekends, Congress hoped to "bring substantial benefits to both the spiritual and economic life of the Nation."

#### Is Presidents' Day a Federal Holiday?

Today, George Washington's Birthday is one of only eleven permanent federal holidays established by Congress. One of the great traditions followed for decades has been the reading by a U.S. senator of George Washington's Farewell Address in legislative session, which remains an annual event to this day.

#### When Is George Washington's Real Birthday?

Although the federal holiday is held on a Monday (the third Monday of February), George Washington's birthday is observed on February 22. To complicate matters, Washington was actually born on February 11 in 1731! How can that be?

George Washington was originally born when the Julian calendar was in use. During Washington's lifetime, people in Great Britain and America switched the official calendar system from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar (something that most of Europe had already done in 1582).

As a result of this calendar reform, people born before 1752 were told to add 11 days to their birth dates. Those born between January 1 and March 25, as Washington was, also had to add one year to be in sync with the new calendar.

By the time Washington became president in 1789, he celebrated his birthday on February 22 and listed his year of birth as 1732.

To summarize, Washington's birthday changed from February 11, 1731 (Old-Style Julian calendar), to February 22, 1732 (New-Style Gregorian calendar).



# TRINITARIAN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

#### A Decade of Faithful Service

Celebrating 10 Years of Pastor Stanley Clark's Ministry To the Town of Troy, NH

It is hard to believe that it has been a decade since February of 2013 when Mr. Clark began his tenure as Senior Pastor of the Trinitarian Congregational Church. In retrospect, however, the maturity gained by our church family over the past ten years has truly been a testament to an anointed ministry of teaching. Upon assumption of this role, Pastor Clark acknowledged the weight of being a Biblical teacher as described in James, "Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness." In doing so, he embodied the calling of "shepherd" spoken of in the book of Jeremiah, "And I will give you shepherds after my own heart, who will feed you with knowledge and understanding."

On the day Pastor Clark accepted this position at the church, his only condition for the Diaconate Board was that he would be granted the liberty to preach from any passage in the canonized book of Scripture. Since that day, messages of knowledge and understanding have not ceased to flow from the pulpit of this white steeple. The most read Bible verse of the church undoubtedly became 2 Timothy 3:16, "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness." Pastor Clark coined the phrase "Read Your Bible" to remind parishioners that the plumb line of the church was the Word of God. Pastor Clark used the Bible to teach but also to correct, sharing Scriptures that warned us to stay faithful to the Words of Christ: "Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths."

In pursuit of sound teaching, Pastor Clark utilized the expository teaching method. This meant that each sermon was structured to take one Scripture passage, break it apart, and explain what it meant with other confirming Scriptures. In this way, what was shared from the pulpit was simply the living Word without bias or opinion. This method aligned exactly with the intent of preaching explained in the Bible, including Nehemiah 8:8, "They read from the book, from the Law of God, clearly, and they gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading" and Ecclesiastes 12:9, "Besides being wise, the Preacher also taught the people knowledge, weighing and studying and arranging many proverbs with great care." In this way, those who listened to Pastor Clark heard only the purity of God's Word. According to the saying of Jesus, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

When the church temporarily paused its in-person services during the pandemic lockdown in the spring of 2020, Pastor Clark began recording his sermons so that the congregation could continue to hear the Word of God taught weekly. Provided both online and in disc format, this method of sermon delivery proved enormously beneficial to the church membership and to the surrounding community. Proceeding through the church's reopening; Pastor Clark continues to record each week's sermons separately to cater to a growing audience of listeners online. The clarity of Pastor Clark's Scripture teachings has reached local shut-ins, families in distant communities, and international listeners in the Philippines, South Korea, Indonesia, Canada, and Mexico.

As of February 2023, a catalog of over 270 sermon videos will have been recorded and shared along with hundreds more that were delivered in the seven years prior to recordings, altogether planting seeds of God's truth in the ears of many. Nonetheless, on the ten-year anniversary of Pastor Clark's first Sunday at this church, his message remains unchanged. In a hallmark sermon titled, "Message Over Method" Pastor Clark looks to acknowledge the necessary preeminence of the message of Christ in an ever-changing world of religion. As it says in Jeremiah 6:16, "Thus says the Lord: 'Stand by the roads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls."

We as a congregation are so incredibly grateful that the Lord has blessed us with such a faithful and earnest Bible teacher as Pastor Clark. As we celebrate ten years of his service to this church and to the Town of Troy we wish to emulate the words of 1 Timothy 5:17, "Let the elders who rule well be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in preaching and teaching."


