SELECTMAN'S CORNER

Voting & You:

We have two elections coming up. The New Hampshire State primary on September 13th and the general election on November 8th. If you are not registered to vote, have never registered, or are afraid to register but would like to, please know that it's never too late. The Selectman's office does not play a direct role in voting, but we understand its importance in maintaining a functional democratic society. If you have questions about voting or need help registering, our Town Clerk is committed to helping people register and vote. The best way to contact the Town Clerk's office is by phone: (603) 242-3845.

Selectman's Office Updates:

The Selectmen's office will be open Mon-Thurs 8:30AM - 5PM. The office will not be open to the public between the 11AM and 3PM to allow staff time to complete tasks uninterrupted. If you call or email during those hours, they will respond to you as quickly as possible after 3PM. Please leave your name and number at the Selectman's office: (603) 242-7722. We encourage

you to visit the Town of Troy website, <u>https://www.troy-nh.us/</u>. We find that many calls are about forms or other information readily available on our website (the internet isn't for everyone, we are happy to provide in person service as well, but if you need forms or info quickly you might want to give the website a try).

Candidate's Forum:

The Select Board has scheduled a candidate's forum at the Rec Center on October 27th. The Troy Candidates Forum has proven successful in engaging candidates interested in representing Troy in any office for several years now. We recommend you attend and encourage candidates to attend. History has shown, the more engaged we are as citizens, the more responsive government – big and small – is to our needs. We expect candidates for the State Senate as well as the State Representatives races, and have invited the candidates from the Federal Races as well.

<u> Town Hall Painting:</u>

The Town Hall painting project seems to be a bust at this point for this year. Our contractor, although heavily advertised and supposedly reputable has been incommunicado as well as MIA. At this late point in the year we will need to rebid the project and hopefully get on the top of someone's list for next year.

Transfer Station:

The Select Board is looking to extend the Transfer Station hours to include mid-week hours. The Select Board has received input regarding the "Troy" plastic bags that are supposed to be bought for use of the dumpster. The vendor of many years, the one that produced strong bags with Troy's logo, either went out of business or couldn't handle our business. We don't know because they didn't return our calls. After many months, the Transfer Station ordered bags, but that vendor provided unmarked bags of inferior quality. It is our understanding that bags of the correct strength with the correct markings will be available soon. In the end, the process requires public participation and respect for the environment we are trying to protect, by recycling, reusing, reducing, and composting to the extent possible.

Water & Sewer:

Troy's Water & Sewer System dates back over a century. Our system works well; our water is safe and better quality than many of our neighboring towns & cities. Nothing lasts forever. It is foreseeable that our system for both delivery of fresh water to households and safe disposal of wastewater will require upgrades and changes in the next few years. Currently the Water & Sewer Commission is investigating grants and other sources of funding so that costs are not catastrophically burdensome to either the Rate Payers or the Taxpayers of Troy as a whole. It is a significant factor in the operation of our Water & Sewer Commission that when Troy Mills closed twentyish years ago we lost half of our Rate Base and we lost a significant amount of flow that was needed/required to operate our system as designed. We will be seeing more about this is the next year or two for now the Water & Sewer Commission is working on options.

FB Live Streaming:

Every effort is being made to live stream as many public meetings as possible on Facebook. This is a private effort on the part of one individual, our Moderator, and his commitment to open government and processes. The challenges in getting this seemingly simple task done, have been extensive. The Select Board has been discussing ways to provide greater support for this process. One of the problems is when the meetings run long the battery runs out of his Go-Pro. The Select Board would like you to know that's not an intentional act to cut off access, (we're not that slick), it's just the lack of the right charger, in the right place at the right time.

Tax Anticipation Note:

The Treasurer has worked closely on monitoring the availability of Town Funds and instructed the Select Board to make early payments on the existing TAN. The result of the early payments has been a reduction in interest due to our lender, Mascoma Savings Bank, and a significant reduction in the balloon payment due to pay off the balance. As of this writing the balloon payment was made ahead of schedule and the TAN is now paid off.

Redevelopment Work at Troy Mills:

The Selectmen issued a building permit for redevelopment work to begin at Troy Mills. The permit was issued based on the existing approved Site Plan for the Troy Redevelopment Group. This plan was approved several years ago. Before this year, site plans and building permits in Troy had no expiration. Issuance of this permit does not reduce the developer's obligation to comply with building codes or the site plan review process, but does allow work to begin, be inspected and benchmarks for performance to be established. The Planning Board did accept the developers plans as complete however never took full action as the developer withdrew his new plans when he felt, rightly or wrongly, the Planning Board "moved the goal posts". In addition to the existing approved site plan the developer has provided the Town with a wiring schematic for the project and a design for a fire suppression system not in the previously approved site plan. By going this route, the developer will need to have significant changes to approved site plan reviewed and approved by the current Planning Board.

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AUGUST 2022 UPDATE FROM THE TROY WATER & SEWER DEPARTMENT

The Troy Water & Sewer Department serves approximately 460 water/sewer customers and is staffed by 3 full-time employees with oversight from a 5 member elected board of commissioners. In the last 6 months 3 new commissioners joined the board and a new superintendent, Thomas Lambert, was hired. This change of management at both the day-to-day level as well as at the board level made for a good time to begin a top to bottom review of the facilities, properties, equipment, and planning of the department to assess where we are as well as where we should be heading.

The review that began this summer has shown deficiencies that will need to be addressed in the near term as well as identified long term projects that need to be prioritized, budgeted for, and planned out. In our review we have found that in the past, in order to keep our rates and budget low year-to-year, many maintenance projects were deferred for far too long, leaving a backlog of projects that need to be completed for either health & safety, regulatory compliance, or facility/equipment life cycle reasons. Our office manager, Rhonda Sheats, recently won a \$30,000 grant for the department for an Asset Management Program on Wastewater and is working on other grant proposals to help us move forward. We are currently working with an engineering firm on a project study for sewer treatment operations for options to get our monitored copper and ammonia levels back into compliance with state/EPA requirements.

The board along with the staff are looking at every aspect of our finances and functions to determine the correct way forward to get our system back up to the operational levels we need to maintain to serve the town now as well as in the future. This could mean standalone warrant article(s) in the coming years to fund long term savings and water/sewer projects as well as rate structure changes for our customers.

The board of commissioners meets the 2nd Wednesday of the month at the water department building at 151 Dort Street at 6PM. The commissioners have also added a second meeting each month on the 4th Wednesday for the foreseeable future to allow for meeting with engineers/ contractors to review the several work projects we expect to need to address in the coming months.

This letter was approved by the board at our August 10th meeting.

HISTORY OF EAST HILL FARM: 1980s

During the 1908s, The Inn at East Hill Farm grew, with the addition of a lot of new buildings. Trailsend was constructed and the Grandmother's Attic section of the Inn was built. This included the guest



accommodations known as Grandmother's Attic, the gift shop, GA living room and restrooms, and the office, which moved from Dave and Sally Adams' house to where it currently is today.

One winter night, Cottage 2 burned down. Cottage 1 was moved near the barn and has been known as Barnside ever since. New Cottages 1 and 2 were built. The horse barn was added to the cow barn.

The Inn bought the Brick House and built the tennis court in 1982.



A variety of new activities grew with the expansion of the physical facility. During the winter, the Inn held several cross-country ski races on our ski trails. After the race, everyone enjoyed hot dogs and hot cocoa. Guests would gather in the warming hut to take a break from the brisk weather, listening to Irish folk singers, Shamus and Eileen.



In the summer, guests continued to fill the Inn's expanding rooms and the activity schedule continued to grow, now including crafts and other games; for example, during July 4th week, the Annual 4th of July Bocce Tournament was started, a tradition that continues to this day.

Kindergarten and New Students: Incoming kindergarten students as well as new students to Troy School are invited to an Ice Cream Social on *Friday, August 19*. New students are invited from 1- 1:45 PM; kindergarten students are invited from 2-2:45 PM. This will provide our newest students additional time to become familiar with Troy School. So as to keep attendance at a minimum, we ask only NEW students and their parents attend this event. Opening Days: This year, the Monadnock School District will continue with "Soft Opening" Days (August 25-26). These days have been created for students and their families to come and orientate themselves to the new classroom, teacher, etc. Classroom teachers will be in touch to set up appointment times for families to come and visit, beginning sometime after August 22. Classes will begin for all students on Monday, August 29, 2022.

Drop off/Pick-up: As last year, parents who bring students to school are asked to drop them off in the loop located by the playground. Bus students will be dropped off by the multi-purpose room (MPR) as well. It is hoped that this will cut down on "wait time" for families. As has been customary, students who are dropped off will be met by school staff to assist them exit their vehicle and move to the playground area.

In the afternoon, walkers will be dismissed as usual. Car riders will be dismissed next using the same procedure as last year from the car loop. Please be patient, as you await your student. Finally, bus students will be dismissed through the MPR.

Please understand that students should not be on school property before $\underline{8:20 \ AM}$, as there is NO SUPERVISION. Thank you in advance for your cooperation and understanding.

<u>Visitors to School</u>: Visitors to school are asked to call and make an appointment prior to coming to school. Please be aware that while pandemic protocols may have eased, it is still expected that no one will come to school ill. MONADNOCK HUMANE SOCIETY PARTICIPATES IN LIFE-SAVING PET AIRLIFTS

At-Risk cats and dogs to be Transported from Florida and Louisiana to New Hampshire

Swanzey, New Hampshire – Monadnock Humane Society (MHS) is partnering with NBCUniversal Local, Greater Good Charities, The Animal Rescue Site and Hill's Pet Nutrition on a special life-saving airlift flight this month to coincide with *Clear the Shelters, NBCUniversal's annual pet adoption and donation campaign that runs August 1-31.*



The Clear the Shelters airlifts will focus on cats and dogs from overpopulated shelters in Florida and Louisiana, and will include vulnerable

pets, like asymptomatic heartworm positive shelter dogs, homeless cats and large dogs. The pets will be transported to shelters in New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and New Jersey, where they will be evaluated and receive needed medical care before being put up for adoption.



The airlifts are part of Greater Good Charities' Good Flights program and funded by Hill's Pet Nutrition and The

Animal Rescue Site. The special missions are scheduled to celebrate the month long 2022 Clear the Shelters campaign, when NBC and Telemundo partner with shelters and rescues to promote pet adoption and raise needed funds. Since its 2015 inception, Clear the Shelters has helped more than 700,000 pets find new homes. To kickoff Clear the Shelters, the first flight is scheduled for Aug. 2 and will include approximately 150 cats from South Florida. The chartered plane will depart Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport at approximately 7 a.m. ET and arrive at New Bedford Regional Airport in Massachusetts between 12 and 1 p.m. ET. The cats will be received by Monadnock Humane Society, Northeast Animal Shelter, and MSPCA-Angell in Massachusetts.

"Summertime is when southern shelters are overwhelmed and completely filled up with cats and dogs, and the Greater Good Charities' Good Flights program makes a big difference in the lives of at-risk animals from the South. We try to help relieve their pressure whenever possible and MHS is happy to be in a position to accept some of the cats in order to help our southern partners," stated MHS Director of Development, Jacques Du Preez.

TRINITARIAN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

Are you hurting? Is there a desperate need in your family? Are you searching for support in prayer, but aren't sure where to turn? Available to all in the community, the Prayer Chain of the Trinitarian Congregational Church provides just this for the Monadnock region and beyond. The Prayer Chain is a group of dedicated members of the church who have committed themselves to a calling of supplication for others through the ministry of prayer.

The members of the Prayer Chain work to share requests they receive from the community through a "phone chain". Whenever a request for prayer is received, the director of this ministry will start the "chain" by delivering the request and whatever details the person wishes to share to the next member who then calls the next, and so on until the entire chain has been notified. Then, every individual commits themselves to continued prayer for the cause. Each request is kept completely confidential by the Prayer Chain members.

In this way, the Prayer Chain is able to provide to anyone in need the assurance that thoughtful members of the Christian community are lifting them up in prayer throughout the day, even when they are unaware of it.
