Voting & You:

We have an election coming up. The New Hampshire State General Election is on November 8th. Voting is at the Samuel E. Paul Community Center on South Street. Voting begins at 8:00AM and ends at 7:00PM.

If you are not registered to vote, have never registered to vote, or are afraid to register to vote and now would like to register to vote, please know that it's never too late. The Selectman's Office does not play a direct role, but we understand its importance in maintaining a functional democratic society.

If you need a ride to voting, or other help in participating in the process, please feel free to contact the Selectmen's Office for help at (603) 242-7722.

If you have questions about voting or need help registering the Town Clerk's Office is the place to begin, our Town Clerk is committed to helping people register and vote. The best way to contact the Town Clerk's Office is by phone and that number is (603) 242-3845.

Candidate's Forum:

The Select Board has scheduled our candidate's forum at the Samuel E. Paul Rec Center on October 27th. The Forum starts at 7:00PM and will be live streamed on Facebook. The Troy Candidates Forum has proven successful in engaging candidates interested in representing Troy in any office with each other and voters for several years now. All are welcome and we are friendly to all. History has shown that the more engaged we are as citizens the more responsive government – big and small – is to our needs.

Budget Process in Full Swing:

If you're wondering about how the town spends money or how certain amounts are determined, ("...who thought that was a good idea?.."), you may want to follow the budget process. In Troy's system of budgeting there are at least three open sessions on each part of our budget. Literally every dime. Departments prepare budgets and meet with the Select Board for review and approval. Once the Select Board has voted to approve a department budget, it moves to the Budget Committee which then compares the proposed with prior years and attempts to reconcile increases and decreases. Once both the Select Board and Budget Committee have fully reviewed there is a joint hearing about a month before Town Meeting where a final budget is proposed by both the Budget Committee and Select Board where the two sides are reconciled, or not, and the final work is forwarded to the voters at Town Meeting.

Selectman's Office Updates:

We encourage you to visit the Town of Troy website, https://www.troy-nh.us/, we have found that the majority of calls are about Forms and other information that is readily available on our website. (We do understand that the internet isn't for everyone and are happy to provide one on one service as well, but if you need forms or info quick you might want to give the website a try.)

The Selectmen's office will be open Monday through Thursday 8:30AM to 5:00PM. The office will not be open to the public between the hours of 11:00AM and 3:00PM to allow staff time to complete tasks uninterrupted, place outgoing calls, coordinate lunches and generally get stuff done. If you call or email the Selectman's office during those hours, they will respond to you as quickly as possible after 3:00PM. Please make sure and leave your name and number. I look forward to future conversations with you and, hopefully, representing you in Concord. I can be contacted at 603-242-3271. Thank you and please vote on November 8th!





We need to be **ready** for more than just temporal things. Digging into the Truth of the Scriptures helps us to be **ready** for eternity!



MRSD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RENOVATIONS

In March of 2021 the district voted for the School Board to develop architectural plans and quotes to renovate and consolidate all of our elementary schools. In the proposed plan we will renovate Troy School, Emerson School, and

the Gilsum STEAM Academy. Mt. Caesar school will be expanded with new classrooms and a new multipurpose room. Cutler school will be closed and all Pre-K to 6th Grade students from Swanzey, Richmond, and Roxbury will attend Mt. Caesar.

A year has passed and we have accomplished a great deal! The architectural design for each school is complete, and we have filed our application to the State of New Hampshire's building aid program. If approved, the State could fund up to 50% of the project.

Each of our schools is in sore need of updates. In the past 10 years the district has voted to renovate most of Mt. Caesar, but the other schools have not been updated in as many as 80 years. Like owning an old car, if you keep putting off the repair projects, then the work is more expensive when you finally decide to do it. Currently our schools have over 100 unique projects and it would take almost 20 years to complete all of the work. Each project that gets delayed gets more expensive because of inflation. Rather than continuing that trend of renovating one school at a time (and leaving the others to wait another 5-15 years), the district's plan is to complete the entire backlog all at once.

Some of the key updates to our schools will include:

- Updated heating and cooling systems, new air quality filters, updated windows and doors
- Modern restrooms, ramps, entrances, and elevators that are handicap (ADA) compliant
- Updated secure entrances and visitor areas to honor Homeland Security codes
- Updated fire doors, fire escapes, and alarm systems to honor life safety codes

Sounds expensive, doesn't it? Actually, the District has collected solid evidence that this plan will SAVE the taxpayers money in the long haul. Consider this: if you have to choose between fixing the brakes or replacing the tires on your car, the project you decide to hold off on will cost more next year. For our schools, the alternative to our current method of approving a single project each year (and suffering inflation on all the other projects) is to finance all of the work at once with a bond (like a mortgage). This will create a more predictable tax rate for the life of the loan. The key difference between a bond

and a mortgage is that you pay the same amount each month with a mortgage, but with a bond you pay less each year. This project is also expected to save money in our everyday expenses: For example, the cost to heat and cool renovated buildings will be lower than it is today.

Our next steps are to secure detailed quotes and a GMP (guaranteed maximum price) from the construction firm,

and wait to hear how much the state will award for funding. Both are expected in December/
January. These figures will determine the specific cost of the project and what will be on this year's school district warrant.

HISTORY OF EAST HILL FARM: 1990s

The 1990s was another decade of building expansion at the

Inn.

In 1993, the staff dorm, and 5 single guest rooms, "The Twenties" was torn down. This multipurpose building was located behind the kitchen and was known as

Barnside. Construction soon began on the Sugar House. The Sugar House has five bedrooms, each with their own private bathroom, and one living room with a fireplace.

Screened in porches on both sides of the building allow for views of the farm animals. This unit accommodates at least 2 families, sometimes more. In 1995, land was cleared near the start of the trail leading to the pond to begin building

the English Cottage. The English Cottage was a completely new guest accommodation, not replacing any existing building. The English Cottage was also able to house an additional 2 families or more. There are two separate units, each has two bedrooms, two bathrooms and a living room

near English Cottage.

In 1997, original Cottages 3, 4, 5, and 6 were torn down and the Village Bunkhouse was constructed. The original cottages were two-bedroom units with a single bathroom and small sitting room in each cottage. The Village Bunkhouse units were built with a similar setup in mind with a few added perks. The two downstairs units each have two bedrooms, two bathrooms and a living room with a fireplace. The two upstairs units have two bedrooms and one bathroom. There is a shared deck which faces the main lawn. In the basement of The Village Bunkhouse there is a

guest laundry and two massage rooms.

In 1997, the barnyard saw the addition of the sheep shed which was necessary as the herd was growing. The chicken coop got an expansion as more chickens were needed to meet the demand for eggs.

At this time, there was also an addition to the dining room. This bump out space was used to seat the increasing number of guests at the Inn. Guests have many names for this treasured space, but we refer to it as "The small dining room". With its cozy fireplace, exposed beams and views of the barnyard, the small dining room is a favorite space for smaller group events or large family gatherings.

A new East Hill Farm tradition began in the late 1990s. When guests checked in, the kids received baskets to collect chicken eggs. (They had previously been given a cowboy hat at check in.)

When children collected eggs, they would write their names on the egg and store them on big egg flats in the guest refrigerator, which was located in the kitchen near the dish room. At breakfast time kids could retrieve their own special eggs and give them to the dining room server for the cook to prepare.

The egg collecting tradition has continued at the Farm, only now, children are given egg cartons to put their eggs in. The cooks still happily cook the eggs any way you want them so you can enjoy the freshest eggs possible. Over the years, many an egg has met their untimely demise hitting the floor or the ground before making it to the


Risk Assessment

I love chocolate. But there is the matter of risk—would I wrestle a grizzly bear for a candy bar? Probably not. The risks outweigh the benefits. The reality is that love always comes with risk. We could even say that it is a good way to measure love—how much would you risk for the one you love? We may not give that risk assessment much conscience time, but we all do it because the risks are real (look at it from the point of view of the chocolate).

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
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
