SELECTMAN'S CORNER

Selectman's Office Updates:

The day-to-day Operations within the Selectmen's office are continuing to improve. Under the leadership of our Town Administrator, Mary Guild, our financial matters are being handled by Sarah Lashua; support for the Planning, Zoning, Budget and other committees are being handled by Elizabeth Berry. The hours remain the same for the Selectmen's office: Monday & Wednesday 8:30 am to 5:00 pm Tuesday & Thursday 8:30 am to 3:00 pm. We do have a change within the Welfare office. Julia has resigned, and we would like to thank her for all the hard work she has done within the office. Our new Welfare Manager will Tara Chasse. She has office hours at Town Hall on Monday & Wednesday 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. She can be reached by calling Town Hall at 603-242-7722 or emailing Welfare@Troy-NH.US All applications can be found on the town website or picked up at Town Hall. The Select Board has received the final copy of the 2018 & 2019 audits. There was a surplus which means the Selectmen controlled town spending and came in under the authorized amount. This should lead to some level of tax relief in the coming year.

Reassessment of Properties:

As the current reassessment is slated to be finished at the end of September. If you believe there is a significant error in your new assessment when you receive it, there are three opportunities to address this. First, when you get the assessment, you will be given an opportunity to schedule a meeting with the Assessor at Town Hall. Second, should that not resolve the issue you can schedule a meeting with the Select Board and meet in person and attempt a resolution. Finally, if neither of those solutions work you can request a hearing in Concord with the State's Bureau of Tax & Land Appeals, (BTLA). BTLA has the authority, under RSA 71-B:5, to hear and determine: all matters involving questions of taxation properly brought before it, including appeals of assessments, exemptions, credits and refunds, whether levied or administered by the state or municipalities.

Town Clerk/Tax Collector News:

Kayla Cashman has resigned as Interim Town Clerk/Tax Collector. We would like to thank her for her time since Dec of 2022. Christina Howells will be the Interim Town Clerk/ Tax Collector. Starting September 4th, 2023, the Town Clerk/Tax Collector hours will be Monday & Wednesday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Tuesday 7:30 am to 3:30 pm. Thursday 11:00 am to 7:00 pm. Please be patient, kind and courteous as she goes through state training to learn the position as there may be times when the office must be closed for said training. Open Job Postings:

Deputy Town/Clerk Tax Collector Part-time position works closely with the Town Clerk/Tax Collector 15-20 hours a week. The schedule varies depending on season and schedules. Some training and certifications are required.

Planning Board:

The Planning Board is updating the town of Troy's Master Plan. If you feel the future vision of our town is something you want to have a hand in and can commit to research and time, please contact the Panning Board and see if you can help. One of the items that has been discussed as part of the process of redeveloping the Master Plan would be to have a series of planning "Charettes" where small groups meet with planners and review specific items to be addressed in the Master Plan or potentially be redeveloped/reevaluated such as the ball fields on Marlborough Road, the Depot complex & Kimball Hall, Old Route 12 in front of the Library just to name a few. There will be a Master Plan & Housing - "Housing 101" meeting September 9th at 2P.M. at the Samuel E. Paul Community Center, 61 South Street, Troy.

Quick Reminders:

Water & Sewer Bills: W&S Bills can no longer be paid at the W&S Plant. They can be paid at the Town Hall, (Blue Box on the Front of the building or brought into our office during open hours), or by mail to P.O. Box 215 Troy, NH 03465.

There's a bunch of things that shouldn't go down your drain because they gum up the works on the other end i.e. paper towels, baby wipes, diapers, anything with nylon fibers woven in, and cat litter just to name a few.

Anything that will require a building permit should start with an application to the Selectmen's office, even if it requires Planning Board review and or a variance from the Zoning Board of Adjustment the process starts with an application through the Selectmen's Office.

STATE HOUSE UPDATE

The NH House will have wrapped up its work for the Winter/Spring Session in late June will now begin Hearings in the Fall on Bills "Retained in Committee" from the Winter/Spring Session.

It is also possible for a Bill to be "Retained in Committee" meaning that a majority of members of a Committee couldn't agree up or down on a Bill but felt it required further consideration at a later time. Typically, reconsiderations by Committee occur in the Fall, which is beginning now.

Sometimes a Bill has split recommendations within a Committee. The House is currently very nearly divided 50/50 which means the Committees are equally divided so if there's not bi-partisan support Bills don't move - not necessarily a bad thing in my opinion. "Retained Bills" are bills that in broad terms a significant number or majority of members felt have merit but either would be un-likely to pass in their initial form or needed fine tuning before being considered by the whole House. Essentially, "Close, but no cigar, come back and try again!" for most of these bills. There is also the case of many Bills that are subject to the review of more than one Committee, principally due to financial or potential financial implications and a Bill that comes to the floor of the House for a vote and is referred back to another Committee and/or to the Finance Committee.

I serve on the Commerce Committee which oversees Alcohol, Tobacco, Insurance and potentially Marijuana as well as a host of other issues.

Based on the votes taken earlier this year and the back and forth between the Governor, the Senate and the House on the issue of legalization of Marijuana as well as the Governor's recent public statement that he expects to get legalization done before then end of his term it is my expectation that there will be significant hearing time spent by the Commerce Committee on this issue in the next three months. There seems to be three tracks towards legalization at this time.

The Libertarian track, which was neatly summarized in a basically One Sentence Bill that failed by a significant margin earlier this year. This track simply removes any restrictions or regulation of Marijuana, no taxes or oversight. It would appear to be a non-starter. The two other tracks basically breakdown into a House Bill which legalizes and regulates private retail sale and distribution of Marijuana and imposes a 12.5% Tax on the Wholesale level and a "No new Tax" approach which restricts the sale and distribution to State Liquor Stores. The Fall Commerce Committee Hearings are likely to be lively.

Late in August along with several other house members I had the opportunity to meet with members of the opposition to the <u>Lukashenko</u> dictatorship in the Country of Belarus. (Belarus if you can't quit picture, it on a map is

located between Poland, Lithuania, Russia and Ukraine.) The primary focus of our visitors was to understand how and why democracy works in New Hampshire. The common ground that I believe all of the NH House Members, (Democrats, Republicans & Libertarians), in attendance shared is an immediate appreciation of our country and especially the rights that we have and take for granted when compared to a dictatorship such as Belarus. By the same token our visitors found the idea of Town Meeting and a government that is intended to serve and respond to the people mind blowing. They come from a place where people live and work to serve the State.

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


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
